Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal 2010...



For so many of you, the leaflet with this edition of Cross Talk will be a familiar sight. It is the Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal giving each one of us the opportunity once more to make a difference this Christmas to the life of a child. Thousands of children who receive these boxes are orphans; others are homeless, refugees or victims of war and natural disasters. All have a story to tell, and whether a child or teenager, everyone is in huge need. - like the orphaned teenagers in Russia who shelter for warmth in the underground system of pipes for sewage and hot water.

The leaflet explains how Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal works and how to pack a shoebox for a child or teenager with suitable and simple gifts. What the leaflet does not have room to say is that by including notebooks and pens you may well provide the opportunity for a child to attend school and, therefore, provide greater hope for their future. For a child with nothing, receiving a filled shoe box shows them that someone somewhere does care, that they have not been forgotten, that they are loved. It really can make a world of difference.

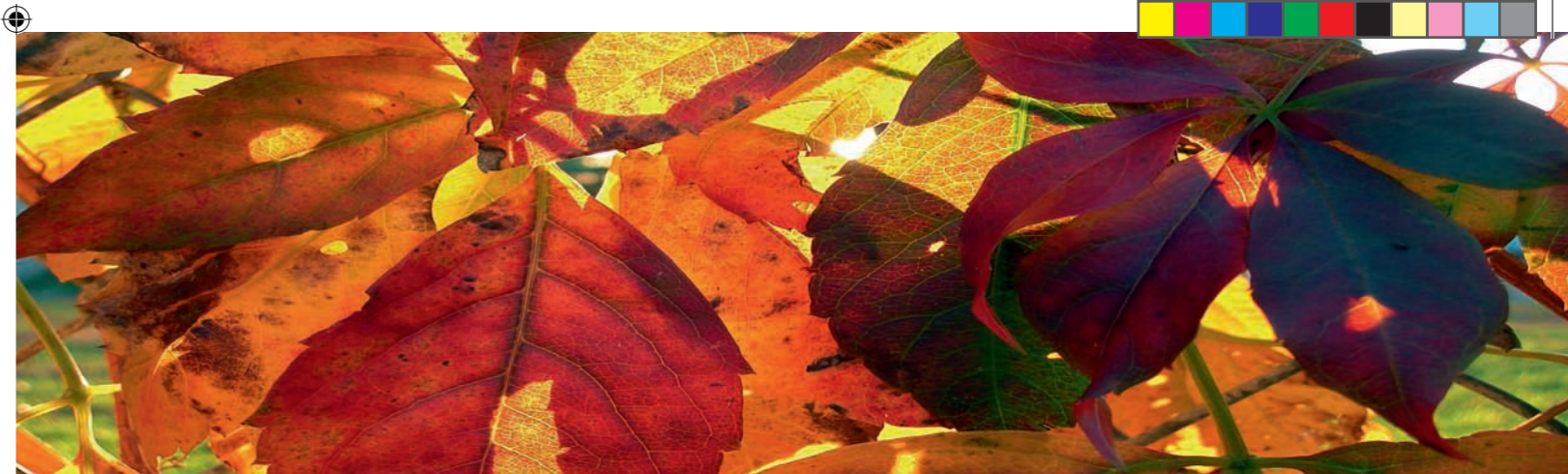
Please would you consider bringing that love to a child this Christmas?

The 'big society'...

Recent newspaper articles have published research suggesting which groupings in society are the happiest and most content.



It seems that 'happiness begins at 55' according to the study carried out by First Direct. It showed that 53% of those who have hit 55 describe themselves as 'happy' and 'content' rather than 'stressed' and 'self-conscious'.

2000 people of a variety of ages were also surveyed by Relate and their findings suggested that the mid-life crisis is arriving earlier 'as loneliness, work and money issues take their toll on well-being'.

Many of this young age group admitted to not having enough time for family or friends because of work commitments. Constant emails on mobile phones were blamed for putting strain on relationships at home and a huge 40 per cent of this age group said they thought their partners had been unfaithful.

Mind you, when you google these subjects you also find that 7 year olds in Northern Ireland are the happiest in UK; Bruce Willis is the happiest he has ever been and women age gracefully!

Another article suggested men are happier than women because, 'everything on their face stays its original colour' and 'you don't have to stop and think

which way to turn a bolt'.

Two of the most powerful experiences in life are achieving and connecting – both are directly related to our well-being. Achieving is not a bad thing if it's done in the right way but it is no substitute for connecting. The challenge is how to stay connected when we spend most of our life achieving. Disconnection and loneliness are two of modern society's greatest ills.

We are all waiting with baited breath to see what this 'big society' looks like, but while we wait, surely it has something to do with being re-connected to one another. I believe there are secret settings all over the place where this is already happening, where people are finding love, acceptance, new meaning and purpose. It's called the Church!

The 'big society' is no new idea because I believe it was always God's idea that each of us was created to live in community. It is the one indispensable condition for human flourishing. I know for a fact that church communities are by no means perfect and there are times when they demonstrate anything but inclusion and love yet, at their best, they become a community of loving people representing the very heart of God.

One Christian commentator describes community like this,

'Christian community is made up of people with all their richness, but also all their weakness and poverty, of people who accept and forgive each other, who are vulnerable with each other. Humility and trust are more at the foundation of community than perfection'.

As the church gathers round the life of Jesus Christ it begins to mirror something of this new community. That's my continued aspiration for St Mary's, Cogges and St. James, South Leigh. I hope you find something of this type of community when you come to church.
